PREVALENCE

The rate of decayed, missing and filled teeth of children in Northwestern Ontario is twice as high as other regions of Ontario.



NON-FLUORIDATED DRINKING WATER

Thunder Bay and District communities do not add fluoride to their drinking water. Evidence shows that fluoridated water reduces tooth decay.



NEGATIVE EFFECTS

Poor oral health may cause: Lower self esteem More school absences Speech and language delays Pain and infection Risk for adult chronic diseases



SCHOOL SCREENINGS

6227 children screened 17% have tooth decay 9% identified with an urgent oral health care need



HOSPITAL VISITS

232 oral health-related visits to emergency department 522 day surgeries

1650 children participated Services include: Scaling, polishes, fluoride, sealants, and oral health education



JK-GRADE 1 FLUORIDE VARNISH

9 schools participated 237 students enrolled

816 children ages 0-4 screened 909 children received fluoride varnish
